When my father died, the Episcopus Corvopolitani, Bishop (now Archbishop) Carroll announced that a Requiem Mass for his soul would be said in the Chapel at Calvary Hospital. "But, Your Grace, Dr Holmes wasn't a Catholic" protested someone. "So?" replied the bishop.

During the early part of 1939, the temperature was over 100°F every day for twelve weeks in Wagga Wagga. My father saved a heat struck patient, with a body temperature of 111.2°F, by putting him in a bath at the hospital and loading him with 50 lb (22 kg) blocks of ice - no air-conditioning in 1939. He thought that survival after such a temperature was probably a record. I personally never went above 108°. Another possible record: during Dad's residency at Crown Street Women's Hospital in 1935, he delivered 13

babies normally, carried out two high forceps deliveries and operated on a woman with a ruptured ectopic pregnancy, in a 12 hour night shift, by himself.

Dad took all the aspects of medical ethics very seriously indeed. He never discussed his patients with anyone, at home, or anywhere else. My closest friend Ronald Clayton was taken to the Base Hospital late one Friday night for an emergency appendectomy. I didn't find out until I went to school on the Monday and someone told me: Dad hadn't mentioned it.

Like his father, Dad was made a Serving Brother of the Order of St Joehn of Jerusalem for services to medicine, Typically, my father claimed that this was in recognition of his dedication to the Order exemplified by "his consistent ability to sleep through 30 years of ambulance meetings".

After it seemed reasonably certain that I would survive a multiple depressed fracture of the skull caused by an iron pole that fell on my head, the lawyers for the NSW Electricity Commission, who admitted responsibility for the accident, set up a meeting with Dad and his lawyer for a pre-court discussion on compensation. I had missed half a year of schooling, was on psychotropic drugs, suffered frequent recurrent headaches, loss of memory and was still partly paralysed. They asked Dad what he wanted. He replied "If you pay the medical expenses arising from this accident, I will not make any further claim." They couldn't get a document drawn up fast enough! Dad signed, and they left. My father's lawyer pointed out, in considerable astonishment and some chagrin, that they could have been made to pay at least twenty thousand pounds, about \$500,000 in today's money. Dad's reasoning? "Malcolm is a spastic hemiplegiac. He has already overcome several other medical difficulties. By the time the legal system has finished with him, emphasising his paralysis, loss of memory, headaches and the like, they will have convinced him that he is unemployable, and I know he isn't." He was right, he knew me and knew that I would have reacted in exactly that fashion. I thank him for over thirty years of gainful, enjoyable employment and the sense of pride which goes with it.

Dad taught a course in First Aid to the students of the Wagga Agricultural College for many years, remarking that the only thing that kept him going was marking their exams. He particularly enjoyed two efforts: Treatment for Shock: "give her a warm drink and rape in a warm blanket", to which he commented "Then what?"; and the diagram of blood movement through the heart in which the flow followed a figure - eight pattern, thus never leaving the organ.

Dad left quite a small estate, especially considering what people think doctors earn. Many years after his death, another doctor told me that, one Thursday lunchtime, leaving the operating theatre, Dad remarked "Well, that pays for the children for this week." He was spending 70% of his income paying for our education. Allen was at boarding school from 1949 - 53, John from 1950 - 58, I from 1951 - 55, Phillipa from 1958 - 60, and John was at St Paul's College from 1957 - 62, and I was there from 1959 -62, all at Dad's expense. This totalled 30 pupil-years at more than 300 pounds per year, equivalent to about \$12,000 p.a. nowadays.

My father was the only person that I ever heard of who was allergic to alcohol - to C2H5OH - to alcohol itself, or if not itself, to a volatile congeneric. A drink, or a trifle - but not a casserole - containing alcohol had an immediate and long-lasting effect. This sensitivity manifested itself as an instantaneous headache followed by swelling and stiffening of the fingers of both hands, a condition not conducive to facile medical practice. The stiffening took many days to subside. This problem was of little importance compared to severe

arthritis which plagued him as long as I can remember. He had given up playing the piano by the time I was a teenager - a terrible loss, and surgery soon after, concentrating on anaesthetics. This predilection for arthritis came to him from his mother, in whose family it was endemic. I only ever remember her as a bedridden invalid. All her children suffered cruelly from it in various forms. My brothers and sister have inherited this disability, and regard me as fortunate as I only have gout.

Why did none of us do Medicine? After all, Grandad was a doctor, graduating MBChM in 1900 from the University of Sydney followed by all his sons: Tag graduating MBBS in 1931, Dad in 1932 and Rag in 1941. Only Tag went on to further study (MRACP 1936, FRACP 1950), the others remained general practitioners. Despite (or perhaps because of) this overwhelming medical bent, none of their children (13 in total) followed them into Medicine - a vet was the closest. Certainly, my father actively discouraged us from doing medicine, as he thought that by the time we were established, medicine as a profession would have little honour, following the American money-grabbing model. How right he was! I am glad my father never heard of Dr Geoffrey Edelston.

Dad had the reputation of a true gentleman medico of the old school, formally polite, gently spoken - I never heard him raise his voice in anger - and with his silver hair, Homburg and three-piece suit, he certainly looked the part. Years after his death, however, his sister told me he was a hellion as a schoolboy. She would only relate the following two stories: apparently there

were many more: He and his brother used to volunteer to take their much younger brother (my Uncle Roly) for walks in a pram. What Grandmother never knew was that they would walk across Military Road to the top of Upper Almora St, which dropped at about 45° down the hill to a right-angled curve which then led towards Balmoral Beach. There they would play their version of "Chicken". The pram would be let go, they would start counting as the pram careered down

what was a very badly-surfaced road, and the first brother to break and run after it was the Chicken. Strictly against school regulations, Dad rode his bicycle down Blues Point Road from the Shore School gates - another 45° street - failed to make the turn into Miller Street - straight into a "toast-rack" tram. Dad's bike slammed into the side of the tram, but he shot cleanly

through, sans bike, landing against the window of the Gas Light Company premises. He was unhurt. My father was incredibly brave, though of course I didn't realise it for a long time. My sister and I shared a flat in North Parramatta when Mum and Dad came to stay. Dad and I went for a late evening stroll, and outside an hotel in Church Street, came on a large circle of drunk people encouraging a smaller group of thugs who were kicking a man on the ground. Dad walked serenely through both groups, saying "Don't do that, you're hurting this man," and pushing the thugs away, knelt down by the victim and began to attend to his wounds, which were considerable. Paralysed with shock at this interruption, the aggressors stood still for a moment, and then ran away. After seeing the victim into an ambulance, we walked home, Dad saying "Don't mention this to your Mother, she might be worried unduly." I often wonder if I would have had the courage to help Dad if things had really got ugly. I sincerely hope so.

Our home in Wagga was named "Caerphilly" after the second family property in the Hunter Valley.

Curriculum vitae of JOYCE HOLMES neé Bowden.

Born on 12th of March 1908 at Murwillumbah, NSW, eldest of five children. Moved to Sydney after the First World War.

1921-27: attended Ravenswood School, Gordon, where she represented the school in netball and tennis, and played in the Tillesley Shield tennis competition at White City for three (may have been 5) consecutive years. 1927: became Senior Prefect, and was First in the State in Zoology in the Leaving Certificate.

1928: accepted Science Exhibition Scholarship to Sydney University. After first year, changed to Arts Faculty.

1932: graduated Bachelor of Arts with Honours in Psychology.

Employment:

1932 -35: (middle of the Great Depression) Matron at Ascham school, governess on NSW country properties. Career:

1936: married Raymond Maxwell Glennie Holmes MB BS on 20/1/36. Lived in Wollongong until they moved to Wagga Wagga in 1937, where he set up in private practice, becoming the Senior Honorary Medical Officer at Wagga Base Hospital for many years. Holmes Street, off Hammond Ave, is named in his memory.

1937: son Allen born. Joined the Shakespeare Club in Wagga, (the second oldest club of its type in the world). Became its longest-serving member (57 years), President for many years, now Patron.

1937-: joined Women Graduates Association, Wagga Discussion Group, WEA and the Nurses Education Group.

1938: produced the first play for the School of Arts in Wagga- this has gone on to become the Wagga Festival of Plays.

1939: son John born. Founding member of the committees which built the Wagga Baby Health Centre (1949) and the Koala (1947) and Kookaburra (1948) Pre School Kindergartens (the first in NSW outside Sydney).

1940: son Malcolm born (eldest born of twins).

1947: daughter Phillipa born.

1940- 1970's: very involved in floral art, as teacher, competitor and judge at shows.

1950-65: member of Wagga ABC Concert Subscriber's Committee, of which Dr Holmes was President. This group bought ABC artists to Wagga from 1952 till 1978.

1957: started the Ranger Group (Girl Sea Scouts) in Wagga. Taught Floral Art to raise the money for the boatshed at Lake Albert.

1965: member of committee which set up Kurrajong School (with Amy Hurd).

1972: after the death of Dr Holmes, moved to Canberra for a year to study Library Science at Canberra College of Advanced Education.

1976: became involved in Adult Literacy Project at Riverina College of Advanced Education and taught adults to read.

1980's-: attended classes at RMIHE/CSU in inter alia, English, Russian Literature, and Geography, completing approximately twice the number of courses required for a degree.

1994: M.A. honoris causa, Charles Sturt University.

At present: Secretary of the Wagga Tree Planters, member of the committees of Riding for Disabled, City to Lake and Red Cross, member of Probus Club. Patron of Wagga Shakespeare Club and Junior Girl Guides. Sports:

Tennis, skiing, running, took up water skiing on 70th birthday. Ran in City to Lake from 1975 to 1992. (missed 1993 because she had to attend a funeral)

The theme of her life is education, in all its forms and opportunities, so naturally Joyce Holmes encouraged her children to become as educated as possible, thus:

Allen attended SCEGS North Sydney then Wagga Agricultural College from 1954 (now the Agriculture Faculty of Charles Sturt University) and became a farmer.

John obtained a Maximum Pass in the Leaving Certificate (1957) at SCEGS North Sydney then and did veterinary science (BVSc, MVSc, PhD), now a Senior Lecturer at Melbourne University.

Malcolm attended SCEGS North Sydney, Wagga Wagga High School and then did Science (BSc, MSc, PhD) and is now Senior Research Scientist (Cereals) at the Agricultural Research Institute in Wagga, also part-time lecturer at Riverina Murray Institute of Higher Education from 1977 to 1988.

Phillipa attended Wagga High School, Canberra Girls Grammar and trained first as a teacher of the intellectually-handicapped at Orange Grove Teachers College, taught at Kurrajong School, and then many years later did her Dip App Sci (Nursing) at Kuringai, now part of the Sydney University of Technology. This curriculum vitae was prepared by me for Charles Sturt University to be used in her citation for her honorary M.A. in 1994.

In January 1969 Mum was returning to Wagga from Pittsworth, Qld, to pick up my father to come to Sydney for my wedding. In the car, a teenage friend of Allen's family and baby Stephanie, Allen's first daughter. Outside Peak Hill the car left the road and slammed into an erosion gully. The Vauxhall Velox was broken in half. The farmer who witnessed the accident went straight home and rang police and the local undertaker, assuming that no one could have survived. On arriving with the emergency services, he found both young people unhurt, and Mum with a cut on her head which has left a small scar.
